Francis, Count Lützow (1849-1916) was an Austrian subject whose scholarly writings helped build support for an independent Czech nation. He wrote a history of Prague; a biography of Jon Hus, the martyred Czech church reformer who foreshadowed the Protestant Reformation; and a <u>History of Bohemian Literature</u> (1899), which did much to acquaint the English-speaking world with the region's literary tradition. Touring the US to deliver university lectures, he was warmly welcomed by crowds of Czech-Americans. He fought a duel with the Austrian Ambassador to England, Count Deym. Lützow did not live to see Czechoslovakia's independence at the end of World War I. His article on Stendahl did appear in the North American Review in 1905. Light mailing folds. Slightly soiled.
